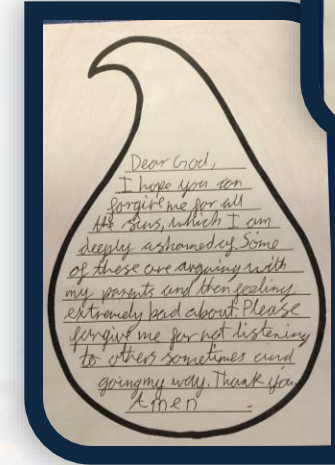
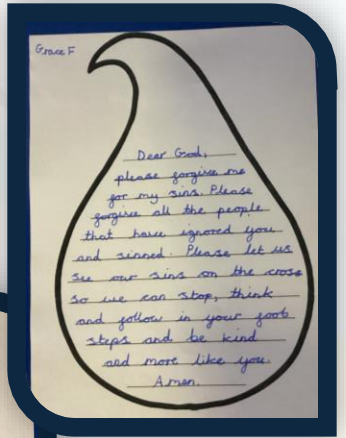
We enjoyed supporting our Year 2 prayer buddies in writing prayers together for a prayer service.



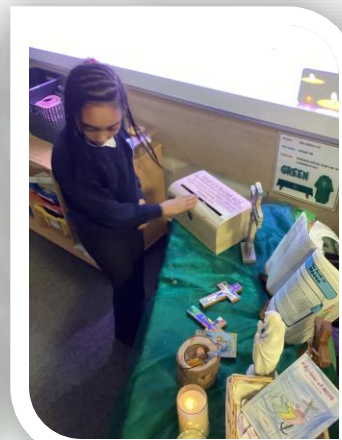
Our classmates led a reflection and we wrote prayers of forgiveness in response to a bible verse.

Candles

There is 5 candles on the wreath. The one in the middle is white for purity and called the Christ Candle. It is lit on Christmas Day for sometimes Christmas Eve. Each one is lit a different week to prepare for Christmas.



Nativity Scene

Some people have ones in their home but in the Church, it is either at the Church front or outside. Jesus is put at the scene on Christmas Day and they put the kings on January 6 for the Epiphany.

(Who does the prologue tell us about?)

Who does the prologue of John's gospel tell us about?

John's gospel tells us about Jesus because it says the word, because the word was with God and is God. The light because he is the light of the world. The true light because he gave light to every person. These words all link to Jesus and it even mentions Jesus Christ.

What does the prologue tell us about them?

The prologue tells us that Jesus has always existed from the start and has been with God. Also in John's gospel there is no accounts of Jesus' birth but there is a prologue that talks about him and he has always existed.


What does the phrase "word the flesh" mean?

The word means Jesus' and flesh means human, the body. Which means Jesus is the Father, full of grace and the truth. It also mentions that Jesus took up residence among us and that Jesus Christ existed before all.

L.O: To explore some of the signs and symbols of Baptism

KG1




This oil is used during a Baptism, it is called the Oil of Chrism. The oil is mixed with balsam (A sweet smelling perfume). It is used on kings and queens and why it is used on other people (and is called 'consecrated' of a new Christian).

KG2



Purity is represented in Baptism and using water as well as the colour white. The water is used to wash away sins and it (represents).

KG3



The Baptism candle is given to you at the end of the sacrament because Jesus is the light of the world and to keep the flame of faith alive. When we look at the candle we are reminded of Jesus and how he is the light of the world.

I wonder... where have you seen these signs and symbols used outside of Baptism?


In church they use oil for the anointing of the sick. And in the Holy Communion you eat the bread which represents God.

Love because there is so much hate and wars in the world right now and we all need love and peace. Everyone has been struggling at one point and we need Jesus' love to help and save us.

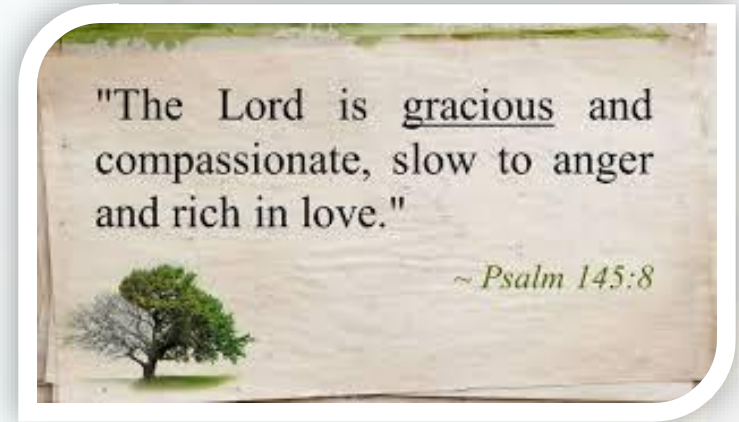
L.O: To compare some of the signs and symbols of Baptism and Confirmation.

Confirmation	Baptism
The Renewal of Baptismal promises when we progress our faith.	We get given a candle to keep.
In Confirmation we invoke the Holy Spirit, maturity and spiritual strength.	In Baptism it's initiation and welcoming into God's family.
In Confirmation we do not receive a candle.	We are given a baptismal name that our parents get to choose.
We are given a saint's name that ourselves choose.	Our parents decided to have our baptism.
	Our parents and Godparents do our baptismal promises.
